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For about 20 years, Mac Hodges (Andersonville GA) flew his giant B-29 across the SE USA at major RC events. Over the years he went thru 3 of them, each ending in a crash. He would T/O and climb up to about 400 feet and drop the Bell X-1 model (flown by another pilot) and it would glide down until at about 10 ft. high on final approach, it would fire off a rocket and climb vertical to about 200 ft. and glide back to a landing. Then Mac would put the B-29 into a spin down to about 100 feet and put on an aerobatic show with it. Looked odd to me to see a B-29 making a low inverted pass down the runway. After he lost the 3<sup>rd</sup> model, his flying demo show was permanently finished. Mac had a big flying field on his farm with the best RC Model shop I have ever visited. I could land my full size J-3 Piper Cub or my Full Size Cessna 150 on his model runway and shop at his great hobby shop. Those were the Days.



## STRANGE INCIDENT – ACCURATE STORY

This is my Sig Senior Kadet that I had bought for a very good price from one of my fellow club members in Alabama. He had become inactive in the club and offered to sell me this airplane minus radio and engine for 25 bucks. I bought it, installed an engine and radio that I had removed from one of my crashed airplanes.

I didn't give much thought about how old the model was, it had only about 5 flights on it. On the first flight I checked out the flight handling in the air and when it flew well, I opened the throttle, built up a high airspeed in preparation for some aerobatics. I heard a loud noise and noticed some pieces of covering material floating around in the sky and the model begin a gentle dive for the ground. Seeing this, I closed the throttle and mentally began to prepare myself for the crash.

Somehow, I must have instinctively pulled nose up on the controls and the model responded. After some other control movements, I began to realize I had some partial control with the nose very high. I managed to land it and when I taxied in I found that the wing covering was ripped off of the top of both wings. The model had been flying very nose high with just the covering on the bottom of the wing. Later when I told the previous owner the story, he did mention that the wing had been stored next to a large window in his shop where the afternoon sun shown directly on the top of the wing for about 3 years. Most likely the sun's ultraviolet rays had cooked the top covering of the wing and weakened it. My high airspeed had put more stress on it than it could take. I was ever so lucky that both sides of the wing covering had let go. If it was just one wing, that would have caused an uncontrolled roll rate and a crash.

I have had a few bad-luck crashes in my RC life, but this was one very good-luck **SAVE**. I recovered the entire airplane and converted it to electric power and I still fly it and it is one of my favorite airplanes to fly in my old age. I removed the narrow aluminum landing gear and installed a very wide music wire homemade landing gear so the wind does not blow it up on one wing during taxiing. I also replaced the nose gear with a very heavy duty model that would withstand hard landings. It is, unfortunately, no longer being sold.
